AS VEGAS – The largest softball tournament in the world, the Senior Softball World Championships, kicks off Sept. 14 here and draws the biggest divisions in the sport through Oct. 1.

In addition to favorites such as the International Co-Ed division and 90+ Game, SSUSA will introduce two very special events this year.

The first is a game pitting a galaxy of Las Vegas Celebrities against the Wounded Warrior softball team.

Maui Spirit: Strength From Ashes Ancient Call to Rebuild Lives

Softball News Report AUI, Hawaii – Not far from the ashes that was Lahaina, a Kahuna lapa'au or traditional Hawaiian priest stood on the fresh green grass of a softball field and recited Ho'oponopono.

That ceremony took place on a bright morning in 2012, more than a decade before the devastating fire that consumed the town and took more than 100 lives.

Three Senior Softball USA teams from the mainland were being hosted by three Maui teams for a tournament. This SSUSA tournament has **Continued on page 5**

The news from Hawaii, more specifically Maui, has been nothing short of horrific. The raging fires that swept through the peaceful island community have taken more than 100 lives, burned hundreds of homes and commercial properties and left a vast wasteland along the shores of the Blue Pacific.

been repeated on Maui more than a dozen times since 1992, bringing hundreds of players together and establishing long-lasting friendships.

The ancient prayer is defined as many things, including a call to balance all good things in life. It also asks to repair all things in life.

"Nowhere is this prayer more needed than today for the 140 SSUSA players and thousands of their fellow Maui citizens," said Terry Hennessy, SSUSA chief executive officer.

"It embodies the positive and powerful Hawaiian

spirit."

In large part, the story of the nation's deadliest fire in more than a century no longer gets the media coverage it once did.

But to recap briefly, here's what we now know. At least 115 people died in the fierce blaze and several hundred remain missing.

Lahaina, as thousands of Senior Softball players know, is the one-time capital of former Hawaiian kingdom and as the home to high-ranking chiefs for centuries.

In recent years, the oceanfront town became popular with our players and their families who made annual visits to enjoy the warm waters and relaxing atmosphere.

For Senior Softball players everywhere, the Maui fire story has hit too close to

home


Tragically, just as Senior Softball USA prepares for its largest tournament of the year with more than 650 teams coming to Las Vegas in the coming days, some but not all teams from Hawaii have understandably had to cancel their plans to compete.

But remarkably, three teams from Maui will be on the fields in Las Vegas, playing their hearts out for their island state and for those teams that could not come this year.

Senior Softball USA will be honoring those three teams at the World Championships by awarding them the Steve Simmons Memorial Sportsmanship Award for 2023.

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Have Your Say in the SSUSA Rules Process

ules for rosters have evolved over the past three decades and become more complicated as we address issues that give some teams advantages over other teams.

We call it the 5 percent rule.

While 95 percent of the teams could follow just a few roster rules and maintain fair competition, about 5 percent of the teams continually look for loopholes for advantages.

Every time that happens, we are forced to address the loophole. And, poof, another rule.

Senior softball is not alone. Other sports, and indeed other parts of life, face the same issue.

Once a rule is made, we strive to make no exceptions during the season. Why?

If we make an exception for one team, it is nearly impossible for us to inform other teams so that all teams get the same advantage.

So, we ask players and managers to send us notes during the season about any rule that needs changing – or if a new rule is required to even the playing field. We address all notes we receive at the National Convention in December, where our National Rules Committee can discuss the recommendations.

Sometimes, rarely, we address a rule change during

the season.

We will be addressing a rule change that I suggested and was voted in concerning 75 and 80 division rosters in a special Rules Committee meeting during the World Championships.

Because of the increased number of 75 and 80 players, we adopted a rule that would get make those divisions "pure" with no underage players. That rule would be implemented over the next two seasons. However, after talking with multiple 80s managers, it became apparent that the 80 division faces unique difficulties because of the players' ages.

To address those concerns, the Rules Committee will hold an earlier meeting in September because this rule affects rosters composition, which begins after the World Championships.

The purpose of all our rules is to maintain an even playing field and make it possible for as many Masters and Seniors as possible to play the game.

friends.

"On our first Sunday practice I proposed to the team, do we still want to attend the Worlds? There was no vote, we were going," said Poree, whose Shootz team had competed in the Worlds since 2012.

"We knew that we would not have the "talent" that we would normally have, but we all agreed we needed to get back to a sense of normalcy and show our Ohana and friends that we can face adversity and remain Maui Strong," said Poree.

"One of many reasons we look forward to coming to the Worlds is that we appreciate the game, the sportsmanship and most of all the camaraderie of our team and families" he said. "Over the years we have had the opportunity to meet many other players and their families with whom we have become very close."

In an effort to help support those affected by the fire, SSUSA has overnighted nearly 400 pounds of requested new clothing including shirts, jackets and caps for those in Maui dealing with the devastation from the wildfires.

Compressing Bat Barrel Helps Produce Power

Softball News Report

he fact that softball bats (either metal or carbon fiber) are hollow adds power to your swing via a spring like action from the barrel adding power to your hits. This phenomenon is referred to as the "Trampoline Effect," causing the ball to gain energy when hit from a springing barrel creating a greater exit speed.

On the other hand, the wooden bat is solid and absorbs more energy without transferring it to the ball and consequently moving the ball slower than does a hollow bat. MLB baseball uses a solid bat and high COR/compression baseball to create the exitspeed. Senior softball uses a "limited flight" softball and a hollow bat to do the same.

As seniors, we are fortunate to be able to use bats that trampoline the ball to the outfield regaining some of our youthful power. The trampolining of the bat-barrel adds to all the hand and body forces you have built up in your swing process. The hollow senior softball bat's barrel compression is more elastic than solid bats and reforms quickly.


To take full advantage of the trampoline effect use a flat lead arm wrist at contact by not bending the lead wrist back toward the elbow in a hinging action. A bent wrist reduces the trampoline effect. Consequently, a flat lead arm wrist at contact keeps the batbarrel flush with the incoming pitch allowing for the full trampoline effect (see insert).

Extending both arms fully through contact results in a throwing like action with the bat; then releasing the top hand for a fluid follow thru around your body. In addition, by keeping your hands inside of the ball when going to the ball and allowing the bat-barrel to lag behind your hands will also support trampoline, resulting in increased ball-exit speed. It's also a good way to hit those inside pitches directly on the barrel and keeping them in fair territory.

The characteristics of all softball bats and balls are regulated by softball associations making sure the bats and balls are compliant with their standards that will promote safety and at the same time allowing the game to be fun. Barrel compression is measured by a device in how many psi it takes to compress the bat barrel a certain distance. If the force to compress the barrel is below what the association's specifies, then the bat no longer complies with standards for performance and will be removed from play.

With a higher compression bat-barrel you'll find that the walls of the barrel are stiffer or more rigid and much harder for a senior to compress for an effective trampoline. Senior bats start in the neighborhood of about 200-210lbs compression. As the bat is used and begins to break-in and the compression gets down to about 175psi is when the bat is at its best and is game ready.





The very strong/younger senior hitter can compress those higher compression bat readings which can carry the ball a long way. However, if the bat-barrel compresses too easily it may be maxed out by the stronger player and not as effective. On the other hand, the softer barrel can help the weaker hitter be a better hitter. A bat with a lower compression value means the barrel walls are more flexible or elastic. It is believed that a more elastic barrel wall will produce faster exit speeds at lower swing speeds.

In summary, spend the time experimenting with batbarrel compression to find the one that fits your strength and hitting style.



On another subject, I'm still reading baseball books and I'd like to share thoughts from my most recent reads: "Ty and the Babe" by Tom Stanton and "The Kid-The Immortal Life of Ted Williams" by Ben Bradlee Jr.

"The Kid" is a very comprehensive biography of Williams, a little longer than it needed to be at 771 pages, but it was interesting nonetheless. Williams was brilliant, talented and complicated. He flew fighter planes in both World War II and in Korea, and lost five years of his career to his military service. Some said he was the "real" John Wayne. And no one studied hitting like he did.

The "immortal life" mention in the title refers to the fact that his son John Henry manipulated him in his later years to accept having his body frozen after death, hoping that in the future the technology is invented to restore someone to life.

"Ty and the Babe" is a mini-biography of these two baseball greats, whose careers overlapped. Their styles and personalities were quite different- Cobb the slap hitting base stealer always looking for an edge; and Ruth, physically talented and powerful.

The most interesting thing I learned from this book is that Cobb was not quite the unlikeable cur he was made out to be. He actually had a lot of friends in baseball. And he swore he never actually sharpened his spikes, but he didn't deny that the basepaths were for the runners and the fielders who forgot that might pay a price.

As their careers went along, they developed a friendship and respect for one another, and in 1941, before the war, they staged a charity golf match of three rounds on three different courses. They called it "The Left Handed Has-Beens Golf Championship."

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
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Newest Recommendations for Daily Activity

ate last year, researchers at Vanderbilt University in Nashville published yet another study evaluating how daily activity affects health. They concluded that 8,000 to 9,000 steps per day were best for reducing the risk of hypertension and diabetes.

Numerous studies like this have been conducted. In 2019, Harvard researchers reported that 4,400 steps per day were enough. I reviewed it in the Spring 2022 issue. So which

recommendation should you follow?

These two studies aren't identical. A fundamental distinction is that the Harvard study focused on how much activity was needed to lower the risk of death, whereas the Vanderbilt study focused on lowering the risk of several chronic diseases.

Further, to capture activity data, the Harvard researchers utilized an ActiGraph accelerometer. It's an accurate device, but not one that consumers buy. The Vanderbilt participants wore Fitbit trackers, a very popular brand.

In addition, the Harvard study only assessed four to seven days of activity. The Vanderbilt researchers collected a minimum of six months of activity data for each participant. Thus, the Vanderbilt study was based on a much better assessment of each person's typical activity level.

The Vanderbilt researchers found that the risk of depression and obesity decreased steadily as step counts increased, all the way up to 20,000 steps per day. However, the decrease in risk of hypertension and diabetes leveled off at about 8,000 and 9,000 steps per day, respectively. More than that didn't lower the risk further.

How can you apply these details to your own life?

The most important take-away is that being active is always better than being sedentary. Keep in mind that even if you exercise for 30 minutes, those health benefits are lost if you are sedentary for the rest of the day. Sitting all day long is the new smoking: Don't do it!

The other concept to

clarify is this: Don't confuse total steps-per-day in these research studies with how far you should go on a walk. These researchers tracked virtually every minute of a person's activity throughout the entire day: walking around the house, walking from your car to the post office, walking in the grocery store, etc.

And, while the Vanderbilt researchers identified 8,000 to 9,000 steps per day as the ideal amount to reduce the risk of hypertension and diabetes, they also report that benefits increased with each additional 1,000 steps. This was especially true for diabetes. In other words, if you currently only accumulate 1,000 to 2,000 steps per day, any amount above that (up to 9,000) will help to lower your risk of diabetes.

The purpose of the Pacific Rim Slow-Pitch Softball Federation is to build international friendship through sports.



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
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Umpire Corner: First Time for Everything

hree times in the last three months, uncommon situations occurred during senior softball games. Two involved fair/foul calls in the infield.

The third revolved around a batting-out-of-order appeal complicated by a courtesy runner being on base when it was his turn to bat.

All three plays left players and spectators shaking their heads.

"First time I've seen that happen," several people said in each case.

All three situations also show the importance of knowing the rules of the game.

Case 1: A Colorado senior league player hit a pop fly, loaded with backspin, that landed fair on a turf field about eight feet behind third base. The ball spun back, toward home, and rolled out of bounds in front of third base before anyone touched it.

The players, who umpire their own games, hesitated to make a fair/foul call. They'd never seen the ball do that.

By rule, the ball was fair because it landed in fair territory behind the base. It didn't matter that it later rolled into foul territory in front of the base.

Case 2: During a June tournament in Missouri, a right-handed batter hit a ball about 18 feet high that landed in foul territory halfway between home and first base. It hit the ground at least eight feet on the foul side of the baseline, which almost always means a foul ball. This time, everyone, including the batter and catcher, stood still as they watched the side-spinning ball roll left, toward the pitcher. It finally slowed to a stop just inside the chalked baseline.

"It's fair!" someone yelled from the dugout. "Run!"

Too late.

The defense reacted more quickly and threw the batter-runner out.

Case 3: During the Rocky Mountain Championships in August, umpires called directors to the backstop to handle an appeal for batting out of order with runners on first and second bases and no outs. The offense had skipped a batter. The incorrect batter had grounded into a fielder's choice with the defense recording an out at second base. By rule, the out recorded on the play stood. The batter who failed to bat was called out for not batting. The runner who had advanced to third base was sent back to second base.

Then a director asked to see the scorebook to see the name of the batter who had been skipped. The correct batter due up would be the one whose name followed the batter called out for not batting.

The manager announced the player's name and pointed toward second base. "He's standing out there," the manager said.

Uh, oh.

The skipped batter had entered the game as a courtesy runner. The defense didn't notice that he was



standing on second base when it was his turn to bat. Neither did the umpires. Someone else batted instead, at which point the defense noticed.

"First time I've seen that," one director said to the other.

"Me, too," the second replied.

Normally, the courtesy runner would have been called out on the base and then taken his turn at-bat. If the defense had stopped the incorrect batter's at-bat, even after a pitch had been thrown, then the courtesy runner would have been out at second and would have entered the batter's box and assumed the count.

But that opportunity had been missed. The runner standing at second base already had been called out for not batting. He no longer was due up to bat.

So, whose turn was it to hit?

As Yogi Berra famously

said, "It's déjà vu all over again."

The player who had grounded into the fielder's choice returned to the plate.

This time, though, there were two outs and only one runner on base.
