We've got the whole season ahead of us and our hopes are as high as ever.


While it's a matter of some debate as to how long our favorite team will remain undefeated, we can certainly stand behind that claim...for now!

Out of State Teams Win Big in Florida Winter Nationals

Winter Nationals:

our teams completed undefeated runs through pool and bracket play as Senior Softball-USA kicked off the 2024 playing season with the Winter National Championships in Florida.

Those four teams and 12 others earned berths to the 2025 Tournament of Champions by winning their divisions during play held Nov. 7-12. Seventy-two men's teams from 17 states competed at ballparks in Fort Myers and Naples.

More out-of-state teams emerged as champions than did Floridians. New York teams conquered four of the

divisions, and teams from Rhode Island won two. Ohio, New Jersey and Wisconsin teams also captured crowns.

Center For Sight of Florida celebrated its 25th season playing under the same sponsor by winning the 85+

Gold division for the third year in a row.

Top-seeded Isle Edge
Trucking of Wisconsin, a 55+
AAA team, defeated secondseeded Derby City Masters
of Kentucky 25-12 to win
the title and finish 5-0 in the
five-team division. It capped a
tournament in which Isle Edge
Trucking won by an average
of 11 runs per game. Invaders
of Massachusetts placed third.

Men's 55/60+

Platinum: Top Dawgs of Florida swept Tiffany's of Michigan 19-14 and 27-18 playing a best-of-three format.

Men's 60+ Major:

Top-seeded Northeast Autobdy of Rhode Island suffered its first loss, 15-3, in the championship game but rebounded to win the "if" championship 12-10 over Team Florida/Phoenix Tube. Team Mars of Florida finished third in the eight-team division.

Men's 60+ AAA:

Second-seeded Hudson Valley Cyclones of New York capped a 6-0 tournament by defeating sixth-seeded Dunn's Sporting Goods of Wisconsin 15-3 in the title game. Topseeded Howe Enterprise of Maryland finished third in the eight-team bracket.

Men's 65+ Platinum:

Second-seeded Action Auto Parts of Rhode Island went 6-0 and defeated top-seeded Hudson Valley Cyclones of New York 12-9 for the title of the nine-team division. DEEP PURPLE of Massachusetts finished third.

Men's 65/70+ Gold:

Third-seeded Northeast Jackhammers of New York, a 65+ AAA team, defeated fourth-seeded Spring Ford of Pennsylvania 24-13 to win the title and finish 5-1 overall. The top-seeded Long Island Jaguars Red won four elimination games to finish third in the nine-team division.

Men's 70+ Silver:

Fifth-seeded Universal Softball Team of Ohio, a 70+ AAA team, lost the winner's bracket finale 21-9 to the second-seeded Syracuse Cyclones of New York but got revenge in the championship

In a best-of-three format, Venom of Florida defeated Hollis Appraisals/Ted Todd 13-12, 8-12, 21-17.

Men's 75+ Major:

JAG-ONE/Jersey Masters of New Jersey swept Northern Virginia Force 15-13 and 16-12.

Men's 75+ AAA:

Top-seeded Long Island Jaguars defeated the Syracuse Cyclones 25-14 to win the three-team division. Suncoast Outlaws of Florida finished third.

Men's 80+ Major

Plus: Florida Investment Properties claimed the title and TOC berth by going 5-0 against opponents from other divisions.

Men's 80+ Gold:

Bucs and Bulls of Florida, an 80+ AAA team, won the seven-team division by going undefeated in a five-game, round-robin format. Two of the victories were won by one run each. The Indianapolis Classics finished second at 4-1, and the Chicago Gray Sox of Illinois took third.

Men's 85+ Gold:

Center For Sight of Florida won the 85+ Major TOC berth with a 7-0 victory. The runner-up New York Statesmen nabbed the 85+ AAA berth. Main Street Pub of Michigan finished third in the three-team division.

Shaved Bat Scandal and Storms Rock 2023 Winter World Championships

nusually heavy desert rain, nine teams going unbeaten, and the confiscation of a shaved bat headlined the SSUSA Winter World Championships played in Phoenix and Glendale, Arizona, in mid-November.

The tournament drew 184 teams from 23 states and two Canadian provinces. Champions hailed from as far away as Minnesota, Iowa, and Ontario, Canada.

Overall, 31 teams earned berths to the 2025 Tournament of Champions by winning their age and rating divisions during the Nov. 14-19 event.

Mother Nature dealt all secondsession teams a blow. A widespread storm system drenched the metropolitan area early Saturday and left water standing on fields at all five ballparks. At some sites, light rain continued into mid-morning.

The rain forced the cancellation of the entire Saturday schedule at one park. Hours-long delays hampered the other four sites.

Tim McElroy, who served as the overall tournament director for Winter Worlds in Arizona as well as Winter Nationals a week earlier in Florida, appreciated the dedication of the grounds crews.

"Looking back at the two tournaments, there was a common thread: Parks and Rec staff at both locations (Lee County and City of Phoenix) were simply amazing," McElroy said. "Participating teams – all 256 of them – played at outstanding venues with well-maintained ballfields."

In addition to weather challenges, tournament directors in Phoenix dealt with an altered bat situation. After a pitcher appeared to be seriously injured by a rocket shot off that bat, the umpire grabbed the bat and ball, per SSUSA rules, and showed them to his director. SSUSA sent the bat to Miken for testing, which determined that the barrel had been shaved. (See story on page 9).

Separately, many teams put together

memorable tournament runs. One of them, the Iowa Demons, weaved a long route through the elimination bracket into the title game before capturing the men's 60+ Major championship by double-dipping a previously unbeaten team.

Top-seeded FRSTeam of Colorado capped a 5-0 tournament by defeating Not Today of Nevada 23-8 in the championship game. Tharaldson Softball of Nevada finished third in the four-team division.

Women's 40+ Masters AAA:

Top-seeded Cali Freak Show edged Las Maletas of Arizona 19-18 to win the title. My Auto Jack of Arizona took third in the nine-team bracket.

Women's 40+ Masters AA:

Playing a best-of-three format, Idaho Spirit swept Arizona Desert Belles 27-26 and 18-11 for the crown.

Women's 50/55+ Major:

Arizona Dream Team, a 55+ team, capped a 4-0 tournament with a 19-8 title game victory over High Octane/Miken of Indiana, which earned the 50+ Major berth to the TOC. The Dream Team compiled an average score of 17-5 as it controlled the four-team division. Cali Gold Ladies finished third.

Women's 50/55+ AAA:

Second-seeded Adrenaline of Nevada went 5-0 and earned the 55+ AAA TOC berth and overall title by defeating Get Dirty of New Mexico 15-5. Get Dirty

Men's 40/50+ Gold:

Fourth-seeded Amigos of Arizona went 5-1 overall and won the title game 21-19 over third-seeded Wallcon/ Standard Plumbing Supply/ AZ Bandits-Halos. The New Mexico Punishers finished third in the eight-team bracket.

Men's 50+ Major:

Top-seeded Regeee's Rams of Ontario, Canada, capped a 5-0 tournament with a 20-11 title game victory over SPS/AZ Bandits of Arizona. The Originals of Texas placed third in the seven-team division.

Men's 50+ AAA:

Seventh-seeded NSC Heroes of Nebraska lost its first pool game then won six in a row, including a 24-15 title-game victory over fourth-seeded Pro Vision/Café Elite of Washington. Second-seeded El Paso Strong won four elimination games to finish third in the 14-team bracket.

Men's 50/55+ Silver:

After going 0-2 in pool play, 15th-seeded Lokahi of Arizona won all five of its bracket games, including a

Men's 55/60+ Platinum:

Top-seeded Arizona Heat 55s capped a 6-0 tournament with a 19-15 title game victory over sixth-seeded Regeee's Rams of Ontario, Canada. As the top-finishing 55+ Major team, Regeee's Rams also earned a TOC berth. Third place in the 10-team bracket went to second-seeded L.A.F. 55 of California.

Men's 55/60+ Silver:

Second-seeded Tejanos of Texas, a 60+ AAA team,

finished a 7-0 tournament with a 19-7 title game victory over the Weekend Warriors of California. Road Warriors of Arizona placed third in the 17-team bracket.

Men's 60+ Major:

Sixth-seeded Iowa Demons won four elimination games in a row to reach the championship game against unbeaten and top-seeded Minnesota Premier. The Demons extended their win streak to six by double-dipping Premier 20-12 and 27-23. The Sidewinders of Arizona placed third in the 11-team bracket.

Men's 60+ AA:



Bat Doctor Banned for Life; Player Suspended

ltered bats are the bane of our sport.

Why?

They can result in balls traveling faster than approved bats and injure players. It is a clear safety issue.

The problem is that it is nearly impossible to identify bats that have been shaved or rolled.

Two recent incidents illustrate the danger and extent of the problem.

At the Winter Worlds in Phoenix in November, a pitcher was hit with a batted ball and had to leave the field. SSUSA policy is that the bat and ball are taken in case of serious injury. The bat was sent to the manufacturer, who examined the bat and confirmed that it had been shaved.

The player on the Weakend Warriors, Henry Underwood, was

suspended for five years. He is appealing the suspension.

On a related note, the National Rules Committee last week increased any future Altered Bat penalties to 10 years (See Rules Story on Page 12).

In another altered bat incident, a bat doctor and senior softball player, Steve Mummert of Tempe, AZ, was banned for life after SSUSA discovered a website that offered bat shaving, rolling and other methods to illegally enhance the performance of bats. Mummert has been given 30 days to appeal the lifetime ban.

The sophisticated website had dozens of bats offered for puchase, along with the logos of SSUA, USA Softball and

USSA. Senior Softball USA alerted USA Softball and USSSA and the manufacturers of the bats offered on the site.

Senior Softball USA is also working with the Sports and Fitness Industry Association's softball/baseball committee to come up with a field test for senior bats. As part of this project, the lab that certifies SSUSA bats – NTS – is sending their experts to the TOC in Florida in January to test as many bats as possible to gather information for the committee.

We hope to have a standard for preliminary field testing sometime in 2024.

Batter's Box, Altered Bat Rules

2024 Rules:

Midwest Teams Can Choose East, West Nationals

atter's box and altered bat rules will change significantly starting Jan. 1 under new rules approved by Senior Softball-USA's National Rules Committee in early December.

In addition, 70-year-old teams will be able to add three 69 year old players to their rosters for the 2024 season, which aligns with SPA and ISSA requirements.

The new batter's box rule affects where batters may stand in the box before the pitch and when the bat strikes the ball.

The new altered bat rule harshens penalties for using an altered bat. It is designed to encourage all players to insist that no altered bats enter their dugout. Period.

The Rules Committee approved those changes and roughly a dozen others during the SSUSA Convention in Fort Myers, Fla.

Players, managers, directors, umpires and SSUSA staff had submitted more than 30 rule change recommendations to the committee, which normally meets annually. This year, it also held a special meeting in September to consider roster issues involving underage players for 75+ and 80+ teams.

The 2024 changes include: BATTER'S BOX: The committee adopted part of the USSSA rule, which states: "The batter must take an initial position with his back



foot no farther forward than a line defining the front edge of home plate. The batter will be called out if he hits the ball when the back foot is completely farther forward than the line defining the front edge of the plate."

Other SSUSA batter's box rules remain in place, including: A portion of both feet must be inside the batter's box at the time of the pitch; the batter cannot step out of the sides or back of the box during the pitch and then hit the ball, fair or foul; the batter cannot step in front of the strike mat or on the strike mat to hit a pitch.

This change addressed the growing problem of ballparks having different size batter's boxes. Since the plate does not move, umpires should be able to consistently enforce the batter's box rule whether the game is being played on turf or dirt fields.

ALTERED BATS: To address a growing concern over shaved, rolled and otherwise altered bats, the committee strengthened its rules. If a bat is suspected of being altered to enhance performance, and the player refuses to surrender it immediately to SSUSA officials, the player will be suspended for life. (Previous rule was 10 years.) If the player surrenders the bat, and tests show it was altered to enhance performance, the player will be suspended for 10 years. (Previous rule was five years.) In either case, managers no longer face suspension. Instead, the committee approved declaring the team ineligible for the Tournament of Champions and the World Championships. The team will forfeit all TOC berths it has earned.

The team penalty is intended to promote peer pressure against using altered bats. Though not all players know if a bat has been shaved or rolled, guilty parties often tell at least some teammates. When the word gets out, players should react appropriately.

SSUSA is working on additional deterrents, including bat testing to be done at ballparks.

UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT: The committee expanded the unsportsmanlike conduct rule to allow directors to eject a participant from multiple games. Behavior after or between games is subject to this provision.

HOME TEAM FOR TITLE GAMES: The unbeaten bracket team now may choose whether to be home or visitor for the first championship game. A coin flip still will determine the home team for an "if" championship game.

TITLE GAME
FORFEITS: Teams must
play in the tournament
championship game to receive
awards, including any TOC
or other tournament berth.
After the championship game,
the participants may, with
the tournament director's
approval, mutually agree not
to play the "if" game.

EASTERNS/ WESTERNS: Previously, teams were eligible for either the Eastern or Western national championships based on whether the team came from east of west of the Mississippi River. SSUSA now will allow teams from 17 states in the central third of the country to participate in either event (but not both) to attempt to qualify for the USA National Championship game at Worlds. Eligible states: Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisianna, Minnesota, Missouri, Mississippi, North Dakota, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

UNIFORMS: SSUSA added wording to the uniform numbers rule to make clear that whole Arabic numbers must be used. Fractions, symbols, decimal points, etc., are not allowed.

Hall of Fame Highlights 9 Inspiring Inductees

ORT MYERS, Fla.

- Inspiring stories about inspiring people highlighted the Hall of Fame Banquet here during the SSUSA/ ISA National Convention on Dec. 8.

The list of those recognized included directors from China and Maryland, players from Florida, New Jersey, Georgia, Tennessee, and managers from Minnesota, Oregon and Florida.

Two SSUSA Hall of Fame inductees were elected in 2022, but were officially inducted this year after the 2022 Convention was cancelled when Hurricane Ian hit Fort Myers.

Rocco Cambareri of Florida was inducted in the Manager Category. Rocco managed and played on Florida Investment Properties (FIP) since 2006 and has been playing senior softball for 30 years. Rocco is also an excellent player, being

inducted into the National Senior Softball Hall of Fame as a player in 2006. In his years as manager, FIP has won the National Championships of SSUSA, ASA, USSSA, ISA, SPA and ISSA. Rocco led his team to the coveted Triple Grand Slam five times. He has also represented the United States in several international tournaments, including Italy, England, Scotland, Ireland and Spain.

John Fournier of Florida was inducted in the Player Category. John played on some of the top teams in Southern California for almost two decades before

moving to Florida in 2017 and joining some of the top teams there. John has been an ambassador for the sport overseas for more than a decade, winning MVP and Best Defense awards for tournaments ranging from Japan to China in the East, to Ireland, France, Spain, Germany, and Italy in Europe with U.S. teams.

The 2023 SSUSA Hall of Fame inductees included:

Zhaoli Chen of Japan was inducted in the Director Category. Born in the heart of Beijing, near Tiananmen Square, Zhaoli has been the principal force establishing softball, teeball and baseball

in China – and throughout Asia. She's traveled to Japan, China, South Korea, Mongolia, Vietnam, Taiwan, the Philippines, Macau and Hong Kong in this quest to build friendship through sports throughout Asia. She is Executive Director of SSUSA/ China and of the Pacific Rim Slow-Pitch Softball Federation, which includes China, Japan, Taiwan, Canada, the USA, Guam, Hong Kong and Macau.

Louise O'Donnell of New Jersey was inducted in the Player Category. Louise

2024 Rules:

Adding Players Simplified for East, West, TOC and Worlds

DOUBLE EQUALIZER FOR 80+ TEAMS: When 80+ teams receive a double equalizer, the manager now has the choice to accept seven runs (the old rule), or five runs and a 12th defender.

CO-ED RULES: SSUSA added two rules and clarified a third impacting International Coed play. 1. Courtesy runners must be of the same gender as the runner being replaced. 2. In tournaments where SSUSA supplies the bats for co-ed play, only those bats may be used. 3. (Clarification): A female batter-runner cannot be thrown out at first base on the "initial" throw from an outfielder. A relay throw to another defender is allowed.

WOMEN'S 50+ DIVISION: Previously an open division, the women's 50+ age group now will have two rating classifications: AAA and Major.

MEN'S 70+ ROSTERS:

Men's 70+ teams may draw up to three underage players, all of whom must be 69 years old

MEN'S 75+ and 80+ ROSTERS: (Approved in September.) Men's 75+ teams may draw up to five underage players, all of whom must be 74 years old. Men's 80+ team may draw up to seven players aged 78 or 79, including not more than three 78-year-olds. (This retains the 2023 rule but eliminates changes that had been planned for 2024.)

ADDING &
RELEASING PLAYERS:
SSUSA has established new roster minimums for adding

teams to qualifying rosters for the Eastern and Western national championships, the World Championships and the Tournament of Champions. Players being added must be the same age (or older) and same skill level (or lower) as that of the team. No higher skill level players can be added. Age divisions that play with 10 defenders can add to reach 15 players. Teams that play with 11 defenders can add to reach 16 players, with the exception that 80+ and 85+ teams are given leeway to complete rosters.

Louise "Weasey" O'Donnell

has played in Senior Softball USA since 2008 on some of the best teams in the nation - both East and West. The teams include Arizona Dream Team, Firestyx, and Team Works. Known for her power hitting, Louise has helped her teams win numerous World and National Championships – and has won the home run contest at the Tournament of Champions several times.

Dick Anderson of Minnesota was inducted in the Manager Category. Dick has not only managed teams, but he was the driving force in establishing senior softball in Minnesota. He was instrumental in the national creation of the 80s division in 2010, the 85s division in 2015. and the 90s division in 2022. He not only managed the 90s East Team but was also one of the standout players in the first-ever 90s competition. He founded Edison High School Sports Foundation that has raised more than \$1 million in scholarships.

Mike Sisavic of Oregon was inducted in the Manager Category. Mike loves the game of softball and has been playing for about 75 years, starting in New York City. He entered the senior softball community 50+ years ago in Portland. He was a playermanager with dozens of teams

winning many local, regional, and national tournaments, culminating in 22 rings. His team won four Triple Grand Slam Championship Titles in the 75s and 80s divisions. Mike helped shape the sport as a member of SSUSA's Player Advisory Committee and the Senior Softball Summit Association.

The Independent Sports Association inducted three people into the ISA Hall of Fame:

Tim McElrov of Maryland was inducted in the Director Category. Tim has been a tournament director, scheduler, umpire-in-chief and manager for both ISA and SSUSA for more than 20 years, with 36 years in softball. He serves as the Eastern Region Director for ISA and the Eastern Vice President for SSUSA. His

work building the 40s program and umpire corps on the East Coast has been paramount for senior softball in the region.

Scott Elliott of Georgia was inducted in the Player Category. Scott played softball from 1979 until his retirement in 1999. During his 20 years, he became a diverse

player, playing offense and defense, infield, outfield and pitcher. He's a three-time Super Division ISA World Series Champion (1996-8), three-time Super Division ISA All World Team Selection (1994-6) and two-time Super **Division ISA World Series** Runner-Up Finalist (1993-4). He hit more than 2,300 home

Leon Davis of Tennessee was inducted in the Player Category. Leon started to play softball when he was 15 years old. After a tour in the Vietnam War (1968-70), he continued to play tournament and recreational softball. Leon began playing softball at the beginning of ISA, founded by Larry Nash in 1984. During his time with ISA, he's won 28 State Tournaments in A, AA & AAA, 5 C Class Church State Tournaments, and 16 World Tournaments across A, AA & AAA.

In addition to the Hall of Fame inductions, SSUSA announced its three top association awards:

The SSUSA Executive Director Award went to Aaryn Val, who is Executive Director of Explore Elk Grove (CA). As the driving force behind Explore Elk Grove,

capacity but also an advocate for community well-being, who actively participates and volunteers for Elk Grove Unified School District, Elk Grove Girls Softball, and the Food Bank, reflecting her commitment to making Elk Grove a better place for everyone.

The SSUSA Outstanding Service Award went to Allison **Gruber**, Executive Director of the Lee County Sports Organizing Committee. The first Outstanding Service Award Senior Softball USA has given went to Allison because she has helped SSUSA not only this year, but for more than two decades. That help has come in many, many forms: Sponsorship, coordination, and most of all friendship. Allison has done all these things – and many more - for the sole reason of helping Senior Softball USA.

The SSUSA Award of

Excellence for 2023 went to Robert Estfan and the Phoenix Parks and **Recreation Department.** During the Winter World Championships in November, a storm inundated four of the Phoenix fields SSUSA used for the tournament. Many cities would simply have thrown in the towel, but Robert came out personally and led his crews on a herculean effort to get the fields playable for the 200 teams competing.

Equalizers Can Lead to Many Questions

uestions about equalizers arise regularly at Senior Softball-USA tournaments.

Most often, players want to know why runs are awarded one per inning in the second through sixth innings instead of up front or some other configuration. Other times, players challenge why a team received an equalizer run in the open inning. Or players question why they must play "down" to the lower-rated team's home run limit.

Opinions on equalizer rules vary so much that the SSUSA Rules Committee received six requests this year to change one aspect or another of those rules.

The committee adopted only one suggestion. More on that later.

Innings

Played

First, a little history.
Originally, Senior
Softball-USA's age divisions
did not have classifications.
If you played 50+, your
competition included all
other 50+ teams. In 1995,
after team numbers had
grown sufficiently, SSUSA
introduced skill level
classifications within age
divisions. Currently, most
SSUSA age groups have four

Grouping teams into classifications helps keep games competitive. It means teams of similar abilities play each other most of the time. Equalizers, meanwhile, help keep games competitive when teams from different classifications, or different age divisions, compete.

classifications: AA, AAA,

Major and Major-Plus.

SSUSA introduced the five-run equalizer first. The

extra defender option came later.

Initially, all five runs of the equalizer were awarded up front, in the first inning. That meant if the lower-rated (or older) team batted first and scored the maximum possible of five runs, it would be ahead 10-0 before the other team came to bat.

Complaints about this system abounded. Being down 10 runs before batting had a way of dampening players' spirits.

About 16 years ago, SSUSA master scheduler Dave Dowell analyzed the impact of awarding runs one per inning starting in the first inning versus starting them in the second inning versus starting them in the third inning. The goal was to find the fairest way to award the runs.

Dowell developed a three-chart mathematical analysis, (Chart left). One chart showed that awarding the runs starting in the first inning proved a huge detriment to the team giving the runs. If the game lasted only five innings, the equalizer acted like a sevenrun equalizer (one per inning played) instead of a five-run equalizer.

Another chart showed that awarding the runs starting in the third inning proved a huge detriment to the team receiving runs. Games need to go a full seven innings for all five runs to be accrued.

The fairest option, according to Dowell's analysis, was to award the runs one per inning starting in the second inning. If an inning played, the run would be awarded.

SSUSA implemented the second-through-sixth inning equalizer run rule in the 2008 season.

This year, the Rules Committee received conflicting recommendations on changing that rule. One manager wanted the equalizer runs to start in the third inning. One tournament director wanted them to start in the first inning.

Dowell dug out his old statistical analysis document for the Rules Committee to consult.

Neither recommendation went anywhere.

The only equalizer request approved by the committee came from Dick Eddington, manager of the Antiques of Kansas City, an 80+ AAA team based in Kansas. His team sometimes plays 70+ AAA teams or 75+ Major teams. The double-equalizer of seven runs does not help enough, Eddington said. His 80+ players cannot compete even with the seven-run assist. Game scores proved his point.

Eddington suggested that 80+ teams receiving a double equalizer be given an option. Take the seven runs. Or take five runs and a 12th defender (the base defense for 85+ division teams).

He believes that will make games more fun for the 80+ players.

The committee agreed.



AS VEGAS

– For the fifth
year, the Senior Softball
World Championships
set the bar for the sport
as the largest softball
tournament of any kind in
America.

The 10,500 players on 654 teams competed in 2,099 games from Sept. 14 through Oct. 1. The 2023 World Championships attracted teams from 43 states, three Canadian provinces, Guam and Germany.

And there were winners. Many winners.

Thirty-nine teams from 17 states won the coveted World Championships title, 21 teams won USA National Championship games, and 9 took the top honor in the sport winning the Triple Grand Slam. (See the list of winners on Pg. 19) To win the Triple Grand Slam, teams had to win the Eastern or Western Nationals, the USA Nationals and the World Championships.





"It was an honor and a privilege to see so many players and fans from all over," said Fran Dowell, SSUSA's executive director. "The play on the field was exceptional and the special events added a rich dimension to the Worlds."

The special events started the day before the tournament started with the SSUSA Directors and UICs re-training to use both defibrillators and basic first aid. SSUSA supplied both defibrillators and first aid kits specifically designed for sports injuries at each of the eight softball com-

plexes.

The first session of four sessions saw the Louisville Slugger Warriors – made up of veterans wounded in combat and college amputees – take on a Las Vegas celebrity-filled team.

The Sept. 16 game, to raise money for the Louisville Slugger Warrior team to travel, featured a number of notable Las Vegas celebrities, including a 3-time Gold Medal winner for the USA Olympic softball team, former MLB and NBA players, the head coach of the University of Nevada/ Las Vegas (UNLV) bas-

ketball team, a top coach for the UNLV baseball team, and a former UNLV quarterback.

In addition, the Chief of Police for Henderson (who is also in a college softball Hall of Fame) played first base and the Dueling Pianists, Tam and Kim Pinegar, a top lounge act in Las Vegas, were base coaches.

Nationally renown singer Kasey of the Marilynds sang the National Anthem.

The second session featured the second annual 90s Game on Sept. 18, with the Eastern All-Stars defeating the Western All-Stars 15-7.

But the score was secondary to the overflow crowd watching the game

Film to Capture Hope, Inspiration of Warriors


he Louisville Slugger Warriors National Amputee Baseball Team is far more than your average sports team.

The players provide hope and brotherhood to veterans and disabled people alike – and inspiration to all who see them play.

Their amazing story is the subject of a compelling new movie, aptly named Curveballs.

General Manager David Van Sleet was awarded one of the military's highest honors in 2013 for his work forming a team made up of veterans who lost limbs in combat. The Military Order of the Purple Heart presented Van Sleet its highest award, the George Washington Medallion of Merit Award.

Van Sleet retired a few years ago, but has kept working with disabled veterans and now includes others who



lost limbs.

The upcoming movie focuses on the competitive baseball/softball team whose players' injuries threw a curveball in their life, but that didn't stop them from playing the sport they love.

The Louisville Slugger Warriors has played against SSUSA Tournament of Champions All Star teams for a number of years.

At the 2023 World Championships in Las Vegas, the Louisville Slugger Warriors played against a team of Vegas celebrities and a few lucky SSUSA players. The Warriors won 22-11 and more can be read about this first-ever game here: https://seniorsoftball.com/?news&story=1992.

"Whether born without a limb as youths, or military members who returned home requiring a prosthetic device," this team can be a home and family, according to the documentary.

"This team means a lot more than just playing baseball," said Carlo Adame, a U.S. Army Veteran and below-the-knee amputee on the team. "We get a chance to defeat the odds, which are definitely stacked against us,



and adapt and overcome. I get a chance to play a sport with brothers who have fought a lot of the same battles. We are not just a team; we are a family."

Van Sleet added, "sports are challenging whether you're able bodied or not, so you can imagine playing ball with an amputation. As most individuals have seen or heard, our players play at an exceptional level, so don't underestimate them. But the main thing this team has done is to give these players another chance to play a sport they love."

The film is to be produced during 2024 by Dreamtime Entertainment Digital with John Biffar directing, Van Sleet as executive producer, and David C. Beaty, Craig Handel and Gustavo Sagastume producing. For updates on the documentary, please visit their website: https://lswarriorsteam.org/.

Execute Your Swing With Consistency & Strength

ou need both arms to work together when you swing your softball bat; a one arm only swing is not ideal, however, each arm does have its role.

I believe you should begin your swing to the ball from your launch position using your lead arm (left arm for right-handed hitters and right arm for left-handed batters). A lead arm beginning to your swing will keep your hands inside the ball as you move to contact. The lead arm should be nearly straight and the rear arm bent to about a 90 degree angle. If you begin your swing with your back arm, you most likely will push or "cast" the clubhead out when extending the back arm too soon killing your swing action.

Try a throwing motion with the bat at the incoming ball instead of just pulling the bat solely with the lead arm.

Hitting ColumnBy Art Eversole

This will increase your bat speed quite a bit and will also square up to the ball better for a solid hit instead of dragging the bat to the ball. You should set your bat lag early in the swing releasing it as you begin extending your rear arm and wrist to the incoming pitch in the classic palm up/palm down position.

It's not enough to just use your hands and arms to swing the bat, you also must snap open your hips driving hard into the ball all at the same time to maximize bat speed. The bat barrel must be "squared-up" to the ball at contact for maximum ball-exit speed.

Contact should happen before you fully extend your back arm. Arms are fully extended after contact maximizing bat speed through the ball ending in a two arm or one arm follow through, depending on if you release your top hand or not after contact.

If you release your top hand, you can finish your swing with the "umbrella" follow-thru. This is where you release your top hand right after contact and continue your follow-thru with your lead arm only in an upright trajectory just like you just opened an umbrella.

This follow-thru is a direct consequence of a slightly upward bat path to the ball which allows you to lift the ball over the infielders on a line rather than hitting ground balls from too much top hand to the ball. A two-handed follow-thru is okay as well.

Remember that a proper hip rotating action, that is in sync and supports everything else is necessary for your swing work effectively. Make certain you swing the bat aggressively and not passively and I don't mean overswinging at the ball. Controlled aggression is what we're looking for in a senior softball swing.

Recap swing execution (see photo below):

- 1. Set yourself in your normal stance at the plate,
- 2. Stretch arms back to start your swing like loading a bow, as you begin your weight shift,
- 3. Use lead arm to initiate swing, lead arm is nearly straight, rear arm is at 900.
- 4. Throw bat at ball for additional bat speed (without letting go, of course),
- 5. Extend both arms fully after contact,
- 6. End in a smooth looking follow-through.

Spend time practicing your swing with the lead arm to establish muscle memory in starting your swing with this technique. The goal here is to have a repeatable swing that will make you more consistent while delivering maximum force to the ball with minimal effort. Hitting a softball with efficiency can be a very satisfying and doing things correctly can only enhance this fun activity.

Learn From the Late Investor: Charlie Munger

here's no question that Warren Buffett has been and continues to be one of America's greatest investors.

The Oracle of Omaha's holding company, Berkshire Hathaway, has racked up a fabulous long-term track record of not only beating the stock market, but in some years handily outdistancing the popular stocked indices.

While Buffett gets all the due credit, it must be noted that his right-hand man and long-term friend Charlie Munger was just as instrumental in the success of Berkshire Hathaway.

Munger, who died recently at age 99 (he would have turned 100 on Jan. 1), served as vice-chairman of the company and was also known for his investment expertise, dating back

decades.

It seems to me that many of us could learn a lot from just taking a quick look at how Munger lived his life.

For instance, like Buffett, Munger certainly didn't live the life of many billionaires. He chose to live in the same modest Southern California home that he bought in the 1950s.

Explaining his rationale to an interviewer, Munger said that a "basic house" has utility and he pointed out "that a larger home could help you entertain more people — but that's about it. "It's a very expensive thing to do, and it doesn't do you that much good." (For the record, Buffett lives in the same Omaha, Neb., home that he bought in 1958 for

\$31,500.)

Munger, who was usually known as a man of few ... but powerful ...words, eschewed the life of living life on the financial edge, preferring to live a modest life.

For instance, he was a outspoken critic of luxury travel and told a shareholder's meeting that he believed it to be quite frivolous. "The back of the plane arrives at the same time as the front of the plane, invariably," he noted.

And back in the late 1980s, Buffett said that Munger's idea "of traveling in style in an airconditioned bus, a luxury he steps up to only when bargain fares are in effect."

When it came to investing, Munger had a simple mantra: Focus on quality companies selling at fair prices, rather than chasing cheap stocks with dubious futures. He also had an eye for spotting a good business long before Wall Street had known about it and the ability to make a timely investment decision.

Munger also was a strong proponent of donating much of his wealth so others could work together, sharing ideas. He donated more than \$500 million to colleges and universities as well as other institutions, including gifts to construct residences for students and researchers.

Munger's life provides a valuable parable: the brightest lights are best when they show the way for others.



Walking Can Reduce Risk of Type 2 Diabetes

n November, an analysis of 10 previously-published studies on how fast you should walk to reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes appeared in the British Journal of Sports Medicine. The authors found that, as walking speed increased, the risk of type-2 diabetes went down:

- Walking at 2-3 mph (defined as normal walking speed) lowered the risk of developing diabetes by 15% compared to walking slower than that.
- Walking at 3-4 mph ("fairly brisk") lowered the risk by 24%.
- Walking faster than 4 mph ("brisk walking / striding") lowered the risk by 39%.

The researchers concluded that the slowest walking speed that still helped reduce the risk of diabetes was 2.5 mph.

OK, let's evaluate the practical implications of these findings:

Several years ago, I did an 8-mile walk. I have long legs and can walk fast. I assumed I could sustain 4 mph and, thus, it should take me about 2 hours. But, it took closer to 3 hours. My average pace was 2.7 mph.

So, I feel that a goal of walking 4 mph isn't realistic, especially for older adults. Instead, shoot for 2.5 mph at a minimum, if you can. But even that pace might be tough to achieve:

The researchers equated 2.5 mph to 87 steps per minute for men and 100 steps per minute for women. Walking at 87 steps per minute is more than one step per second, and, of course, 100 steps per minute is even more challenging.

Here are some thoughts on exercising to lower your

risk of diabetes:

- First, you don't have to limit yourself to walking. Any type of aerobic exercise is effective: swimming, riding a bike, Zumba, etc. Resistance exercise is also effective: working out with weights or stretch bands. Pick something you like to do because that predicts you will do it regularly.
- Second, you don't actually have to exercise in the classic sense either. Lots of house chores also stimulate a variety of muscle groups: mowing the yard, raking

leaves, and more difficult tasks like trimming limbs off of a tree or digging up / planting a shrub.

Doing physical work like house chores involves the same physiologic principle that occurs during traditional forms of exercise: repeated muscle contraction helps those muscle cells respond to the actions of insulin. This, in turn, means muscle cells extract glucose from the bloodstream more efficiently.

Whether you choose exercise or house chores, these will also help promote the loss of excessive weight. This can also reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes.

And any activity is better than being sedentary all week long. That leads to insulin resistance, which is the main cause of type 2 diabetes.

'It Ain't Over' Until Yogi Berra Swings

ne of the most uplifting – and heartening – films to come out this year is about one of the best players in the history of baseball, who is best known for his humor.

The documentary "It Ain't Over" takes a close and personal look at Yogi Berra's life and legendary ability.

"Even if you are not a baseball fan you will enjoy this documentary," said Larry Berra, Yogi's son, and a senior softball player. "It's not just baseball but about the man."

Although best known for his "Yogisms," his career was indeed legendary.

Consider: In his 19 seasons in Major League Baseball, Yogi won 10 World Series Championships – more than any other player in MLB history. He was an 18-time All Star, had a career batting average of .285, hit 358 home runs, with 1,430 RBIs.

Yogi was one of only six


players to win the American League Most Valuable Player three times. Yogi was inducted into the MLB Hall of Fame on the first vote in 1972.

For the first time, the 98-minute portrait paints a complete picture of the sports legend.

"It's very important to me to keep Grandpa's legacy alive," Lindsay Berra, his oldest grandchild, told an MLB interviewer. "Most important to me is to have people remember truly what a great baseball player he was, because I feel that a lot of his on-the-field accomplishments have been eclipsed by the Yogi-isms and the fact he was this short, kind of funny-

looking guy later in life."

Of course, you will see more than one "Yogism" in the documentary, as well.

ighteen players and managers, including pioneers of the sport and an umpire, were elected into the National Senior Softball Hall of Fame for 2023.

While Senior Softball USA has its own Hall of Fame, the NSSHOF is a joint Senior Hall of Fame that represents all national slow-pitch softball organizations, of which, SSUSA is the largest.

A majority of the Class of 2023 are players, with 14 inducted, including five pioneer players. Similar to last year, three managers were inducted, including one pioneer manager. This year's class also includes an umpire.

Here's the National Hall of Fame Class of 2023:

Pioneer Manager: Dick Anderson



Dick has played Senior Softball for 28 years and is locally known as the "Grandfather of Minnesota Senior Softball". Not only is he the founder and current President of the Minnesota Senior Sports Association, but the founder of the Edison High School Sports Foundation which has raised more than a million dollars in scholarships. Dick was inducted into SSUSA Hall of Fame this month. (See story on pg. 13) Dick holds memberships at the Minnesota ASA Softball Hall of Fame, USSSA Softball Hall of Fame, and Senior Sports

Association Hall of Fame.

The Minnesota Senior
Softball Scene publication writes,
"Nobody has done more to
develop, promote, and advance
the senior game in Minnesota
than Dick. He has been a driving
force in developing competitive
teams and viable programs in
Minnesota in several of the


multiple Regional and National Championships.






