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
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### Season of Fun

### 4th Annual Caribbean Classic Set For Late February 2024

ates have been set for the 2024 Caribbean Classic which will be played once again just steps from the guest rooms and beach at the Barceló Bávaro Palace Grand Resort in Punta Cana, Dominican Republic.

Players and their guests will need to arrive at the resort no later than Feb. 21 and stay at least until Feb. 26, although many participants may elect to make a longer vacation out of it by arriving earlier or staying longer.

The 2023 tournament featured three Team USAs going up against each other and three Dominican teams in a five-game round-robin format. "We're always trying to make improvements," says tournament founder and director Jim Goff, "but everyone seemed to like

the fairness and variety of playing every other team just once, so we plan to stick with that.

"Because this is a recreational, draft-format tournament, we have flexibility to do what a majority of the players want," he added. Many of the same players have returned multiple years, and Goff relies on their input to decide on many of the game rules

and other matters related to the tournament.

Tournament co-director Tulio Ontiveros has some improvement goals as well. "Even though the infield is beautiful golf course fairway grass with base paths, the quality of the dirt on those base paths is important, and in 2024 one goal is to have new soil, and to re-chalk and re-smooth around home plate more often," he said, "and

even though the grandstand is in shade most of the day, I have some ideas for providing additional shaded areas for spectators and players."

"Participants have been surveyed post-tournament each year," Goff remarked, "and we try to implement as many of their suggestions as we can. This is why we expect the 2024 edition of this tournament to be the best yet."

### Hitting: Stop Swinging Across the Ball

S eniors have been instructed to swing level from little league on up while playing baseball.

Well, that teaching technique has been replaced by today's swing experts with the "turning of the barrel "or getting the bat barrel early and deep into the hitting zone quickly with a slight uppercutting swing.

This swing requires using a slight uppercut from 25 to 35 degrees from a level swing (see illustration) rather than the long-established level swing or swinging across the pitch.

The level body rotation is a swing across the softball works well to the pull-side of your swing but does create some good hits that wind up in foul territory. The slow pitch swing works best on the vertical plane. The baseball swing works inside to outside corners of the plate. The traditionally taught level swing has been supplanted by swing coaches today with an upright swing or Ferris Wheel motion with a turning of the barrel action to the ball.

The Ideal Alignment is when the center of bat and the center of ball meet on the same line.

Benefits of a slight upright swing:

- •Allows the batter to hit the center of mass of the softball for better contact and greater ball exit speed.
- •Keeps the hands inside the ball when swinging squaring up barrel with pitch.
- •Strikes the ball with a slight lift elevating the ball for more line drives and reducing ground balls.

- •Allows the batter to be able to wait on the pitch longer for better pitch selection.
- •Reduces ripping the ball foul, which is crucial when starting with a 1&1 count.
- •Shoulders move in a rocking motion back toward the catcher and then forward toward the pitcher keeping the well hit ball in play.
- •Allows full usage of the ball park by driving balls hard to all fields.

Review of "Turning the Barrel":

How do we execute the

turning of the barrel swing mechanic?

It is done by applying a torquing action with the hands to the bat handle. When hand torque is applied to the bat, the hands will be pushing in opposite directions. Therefore, torque applied to the bat handle from opposing directions will begin the acceleration of the bat.

This torquing of the bat handle does not mean you grip the bat tighter to execute the opposing hand action. Take your normal grip. Using hand torque, the bat will rotate around your hands from the rear shoulder and then deep into the swing plane, permitting the hitter to

use the whole field.

By getting the bat on plane early, and deep into the swing zone, the hitter can either go out and get the ball in front for a pull hit; or let the ball travel deeper into the hitting zone, for those middle and off-field hits.

Instead of concentrating to strike the ball with your top hand, which can reduce barrel contact time with the ball, try and "catch" the ball on the barrel as recommended by the great Barry Bonds.

Start your swing with your lead arm and then extend the back arm through the ball in the palm up/palm down hand position. This technique will allow the ball to remain a split second longer on the barrel for maximum trampoline effect.

You are in essence catching and sweeping the ball with your swing rather than hitting at the ball which can have the effect of slowing down your bat speed.



### Reno: Oldest Tourney With Oldest Player

**Softball News Report** 

RNO, Nev. – The oldest player in the grandaddy of Senior Softball tournaments played in one of the longest games in the 194-team Rock 'n' Reno Challenge Cup here in May.

Robert McElrea, 91, played with the Top Gun Blue Angels 85's in a 10-inning marathon against the youngsters on the Oregon General Equipment 80s. General Equipment won, 26-25, in the bottom of the 10th.

Teams dodged raindrops – and sometime showers – from afternoon storms that moved over the Sierra Nevada from the west on many of the nine days of the tournament.

One of the showers pushed divisions from Shadow Mountain Softball Complex and the Reno Softball Complex at Rancho San Rafael to the turf fields at Golden Eagle Regional Park in Sparks.

The 35th Annual Rock 'n' Reno Challenge Cup is the oldest National Senior Qualifier in the world. Teams from 13 states and Canada competed during the three sessions of the tournament. The 40s, 60s and women's divisions competed in the first session, the 65-85s played in the second session and the 50 and 55 divisions battled in the

In order to accommodate all the teams that entered the tournament, Senior

Softball USA brought in its field expert from Las Vegas to improve the Shadow Mountain fields.

"Last year we had several complaints about the field conditions at Shadow Mountain and we asked the Sparks Parks Department what could be done to improve the fields for this year," said Terry Hennessy, SSUSA's chief executive officer.

"The parks folks told us they did not have the staff to improve the fields, so we brought in our field expert from Las Vegas, Mike Loosbrook, who worked to improve the infields and knock down some of the lip. He did what he could with the outfields, but couldn't fix some holes from depressed sprinkler heads, so we marked those areas with cones and warned the outfielders."

Fortunately, there were no major injuries reported at Shadow Mountain due to field conditions this year.

### Staying in the Dugout is Sportsmanship

uring a Senior Softball USA tournament last year, an umpire grew increasingly frustrated when players on a men's Major team would not follow her instructions to remain in the dugout while the team was batting. Only the on-deck batter and base coaches could be outside the dugout, she explained.

Having excess players on the playing field creates safety issues and possible interference issues. Some serious injuries have occurred involving players who should have been safely inside the dugout.

Tensions festered as the veteran umpire kept trying to enforce SSUSA rules, and the players kept defying them. Then the situation worsened. The players began questioning nearly everything the umpire did.

An infielder upset at a bang-bang play call ran toward the umpire yelling, "What did you see? What did you see?" A few plays later, a teammate ranted briefly about a call then raced angerly from his shortstop position to the backstop fence where a director stood monitoring

the game. It's unclear what the player planned to do or say, as he retreated after the director held up a hand and said, "One word, and you're gone."

Not only are such player behaviors disrespectful toward umpires, they violate our rules and ethics.

After the game in question, the player who ran at the umpire asking what she saw claimed he had the right to do that. "There is no rule saying I can't," he said before storming away from the director's table.

The team's manager claimed his players' negative attitudes started because "the umpire kept ordering us to get in the dugout."

Time out.

As the director explained to the manager: "You are supposed to stay in the dugout. It is a point of emphasis with SSUSA."

The national SSUSA office, umpires-in-chief and tournament directors have trained umpires for many years to keep players off the field when not involved in



the game. Usually, only one on-deck batter is allowed, though some directors allow two when the dugout gates are far from the batter's box. Managers should not be outside the dugout directing the defense. Scorekeepers should not be outside the dugout at all, unless also coaching a base. Yet directors repeatedly see these violations happening.

So, where do you find these rules in our rulebook?

You don't. Not the full rules, anyway.

The SSSUSA rulebook specializes in explaining special roster and playing rules governing the senior slow-pitch game. From the beginning, SSUSA has deferred to the Amateur Softball Association rules for playing rules not addressed in the much-smaller SSUSA rulebook. In 2017, ASA became USA Softball.

Section 12 of the USA rulebook states that "Coaches. players, substitutes and other bench personnel shall not be outside the designated bench, dugout/team area except when the rule allows or is justified by the umpire." The penalty for a first offense is a team warning, the rule states. "Any repeat offense shall result in the ejection of that team member."

Major League Baseball has a very similar rule and penalty.

About a decade ago, SSUSA tried cracking down on violators by instructing umpires to warn managers and, if necessary, eject managers when team members refused to retreat to the dugout. It appears time to reemphasize this. All umpires should enforce this rule. All managers should help, not hinder, the umpires.

As for who can talk to the umpire, the USA Softball wording is found in rule 4.7.A, which states: "A coach is responsible for the team's actions on the field and will represent the team in communications with the umpire and opposing team."

Later, the USA rulebook says that no player or manager can protest a decision involving an umpire's accuracy of judgment.

Both the USA and SSUSA books say that only a manager or acting manager may seek a reversal of a decision based on misinterpretation of a rule.

Players, such as the one who got in the face of an umpire last year at Winter Worlds in Phoenix over a rule question, should not be involved in these interactions. Let the managers handle it.

Consider also SSUSA's Code of Ethics, which says that players should accept umpires' decisions in good sportsmanship.

Is it good sportsmanship to run at an umpire repeating any phrase that directly or indirectly challenges the umpire's judgment call?

Is it good sportsmanship to ignore an umpire's request that you get in the dugout?

No. And no.

### Navigate Tournament Play Like A Pro

rying to navigate the requirements of national tournament play can be difficult – even for players or managers who have been competing for many years.

Our goal at the Senior Softball USA main office is to answer these questions and help players and managers get the information they need.

In the past few weeks, I've answered some common questions that come up from time to time. Hopefully, these answers will explain some SSUSA policies and rules.

### Why don't you provide ambulances or EMTs at the fields?

The notion that we provide ambulances or EMTs at the field would be fantastic ... if teams were willing to pay another \$500 a team to pay for it. As they may be a bit reluctant, we have provided both AEDs and First Aid Kits (as well as trained staff).

Senior Softball USA is the ONLY softball organization that provides both AEDs and full first Aid Kits at the fields AND training for staff to use both.

### Is it mandatory to play in Qualifying Tournaments to enter Worlds?

It is mandatory to play in a qualifier in order to compete in the Western or Eastern Nationals, and the Worlds. The reason is that we need to determine the relative strength of teams to ensure they are playing in the correct skill level. This is important to both protect teams in each skill level and to ensure equal competition.

A team that does not play in a qualifier can attend the Westerns or the Worlds, but

must play in the next higher skill level – again, to protect the other teams in the division.

There are some exceptions. The 85 teams and women's 55 and older teams do not have to play in qualifiers. The teams in these division are few in number and spread out throughout the country.

### Why can't small divisions of 3-5 teams play in a 1- or 2-day tournament?

A number of larger SSUSA tournaments have up to 20 divisions, and many of those divisions may be only 3-5 teams. When we can, we do go to two days (most non-TOC Qualifying tournaments are 2 days).

However, the larger tournaments require 3 days because teams have voted to retain the 5-game guarantee and in many areas there is not enough field space to fit the number of teams playing 5 games into the available fields for a 2-day tournament.

Teams – naturally – tend to think of tournaments in terms of their own divisions (this is a 4-team tournament). Actually, the larger tournaments are often 100-team or 200-team tournaments. The Worlds is the largest softball tournament in the country, with 650 teams, and luckily only a few 3-5 team divisions

## Why does SSUSA wait until the entry deadline to announce the teams entered in a tournament?

We wish we could give

teams more notice about how many teams are entered in each division sooner that the deadline, unfortunately many teams enter in the last few days before the deadline, so we really do not know until we hit the deadline.

The danger in letting teams know before the deadline is that we may be doing them a disservice.

For example (and this happened in the past), a team may call a week before the deadline and we tell them there are only 2 teams entered in their division. The team decides not to enter. Then 3 more teams come in the last few days before the deadline. The team that called is upset because they did not enter and now there are 5 teams in the division.

### Why doesn't SSUSA provide water in the dugouts?

We had to stop providing water jugs in the dugout because some players were dunking rags and other articles of clothing, including socks, in it to cool themselves off. It became a serious health issue.

Unfortunately, as in other areas of life, a few selfish people can ruin a good thing for the majority, who do think of others.

### Why do rosters have to be submitted by the entry deadline?

The scheduler needs to know the number of teams in each age and skill level in order to schedule the tournament. In the past, some rosters submitted after the deadline contained too many higher skill-level players, changing the number of teams in two divisions and forcing the scheduler to re-draw the entire

park.

These changes often affect several divisions – and the resulting re-draw is seldom a better schedule for any of the affected teams.

That's the reason for this rule:

Rosters MUST be submitted by the end of the business day on the entry deadline day. Teams that have not submitted their rosters by the end of the deadline day will be placed in the next higher skill level for that tournament. Managers should send rosters that include all players they intend to use at the tournament, even if the players have not registered, by the entry deadline.

### How does SSUSA determine the qualifying roster for the Eastern or Western Nationals?

Teams wishing to play in either the Eastern or Western Nationals have to play in a 2023 Qualifier first. Teams that have played in multiple Qualifiers, need to select one Qualifier Roster as their base roster for the Eastern or Western Nationals. The manager chooses the roster from the qualifier in which the team had most of its players.

We ask that managers email info@seniorsoftball.com with the Qualifying Roster they want to use as the base roster of the Eastern or Western Nationals.

If we receive no notification from managers on their base roster, we will use the latest qualifying roster as the base roster.

### The Do's and Don'ts of Saving For Retirement

In recent weeks, it seems that just about every financial planning expert is weighing in on the age-old question of just how much money you need to retire safely and comfortably...and how to get there.

Every time I see these reports come out it reminds me of a long-time friend of mine who seemingly had all the answers years ago.

I couldn't get over the fact that she lived in a very nice home with a luxurious pool, yet only worked parttime at a bank and later at a flower shop. Things didn't add up at all as to how she was even able to cover her mortgage, to say nothing about all her other bills.

Her answer was simple: She was using her small inheritance to meet her monthly obligations which far outpaced her monthly income.

When I told her that this seemed to be a short-term strategy, she readily agreed, but nervously added that she had a financial plan for her retirement years.

Here it is and I'm not kidding: She was regularly buying lottery tickets!

Well, she didn't win the lottery and eventually she went through her inheritance money and sadly now lives in a one-bedroom apartment, trying to make ends meet living on Social Security.

While that's an extreme picture of how not to plan for retirement, it does point out one of the biggest problems in getting to retirement's door, and that's not being able to meet your obligations while you're still working.

The point is, studies that say you need something like \$1 million or \$2 million to retire comfortably may or may not be right as there is no one answer for everyone. Much of it depends on how much it takes for you to live now and several other factors, most notably where you live.

I imagine a senior can live a heck of a lot cheap in Kansas than in California, New York or at some glitzy beach location.



### Money Matters By Jack Sirard

So to me, the first step in this planning process is to figure out how much you are going to spend a year in retirement. Certainly, if you have your home and cars paid off and are always paying the full amount on your credit cards, you'll have a much easier time in retirement and your nest egg needs won't be as great.

But if you're in your 50s or 60s and still struggling to meet your monthly obligations, retirement will have to wait longer than you expect. While many costs

do go down in retirement, several do not.

So, if you think you'll need, for example, \$60,000 a year to live on, put that budget into place now and see if you can cruise along on \$5,000 a month.

If you can, then you'll have a far better idea of how much of a nest egg you'll need come retirement day. If not, then you've got a lot of financial planning work to do.

### SSUSA to Roll Out 'In Case of Emergency' Tags

hile playing in the Eastern Nationals in Raleigh,
N.C., back in 2008, Charlie
Williams of Ohio, suddenly dropped on the field and remained motionless.

Shocked, the players and spectators watched as Senior Softball USA Officials Fran and Dave Dowell and Michael Boone rushed onto the field with an AED, applied the pads and shocked the player back to life.

Paramedics arrived and – fortunately – the player's wife was present to give them essential medical information about the player.

In this case, it was a heart attack. It could have been heat stroke, caused by diabetes, or any number of pre-existing conditions.

Unfortunately, this seems to be happening more and more often in ball parks across the country.

Because it is, SSUSA is introducing medical luggage tags at the World Championships this year in Las Vegas. Managers will be

given the luggage tags that each player can fill out with valuable medical information in case they are unconscious when paramedics arrive.

The new safety initiative was suggested by SSUSA's Eastern Vice President Tim McElroy and as a result, Senior Softball USA is providing players with custom 'In Case of Emergency' Tags.

The tags will allow you to fill out information that is commonly asked by 911 operators and EMTs during medical emergencies, such as name, date of birth, allergies, medications and dosage, blood type, conditions, etc... In the event you are unconscious, these tags will allow your teammates or our staff to answer 911's questions on your behalf, saving valuable time and possibly, your life!

"A player goes down due to heat or health related issues... This can happen at any tournament," said McElroy. "911 is called and the operator begins asking a series of questions. Depending on the player's condition, they may or may not be able to provide good answers. The system breaks down and valuable time is lost."

"Nobody expects to get injured at the ballpark, but we should all be prepared in the event that it does... Help medical staff do their job in the event you're woozy or lose consciousness," added McElroy.

The tags will be similar in style to a luggage tag, that you may attach to your bat bags.

Senior Softball has long cared about safety. Jim Sherman, SSUSA's first National Safety Director, made sure SSUSA has defibrillators and CPR/First Aid trained staff at every tournament. Senior Softball USA is the only senior softball organization to have defibs at all tournaments ran by SSUSA.

"SSUSA is committed to players' safety," said Terry Hennessy, SSUSA's chief executive officer. "We have provided AEDs, First Aid Kits specifically designed to treat common softball



injuries-- and most important, training for directors for the past two decades."

Hennessy said that training and AEDs has saved scores of lives on the field.

The Official Senior
Softball USA Rulebook has
an entire page dedicated to
First Aid Basics, located just
before the Table of Contents.
SSUSA is committed to
taking every step reasonably
possible to keep our players
and teams safe. In this spirit,
SSUSA is adding a new
safety suggestion.

SSUSA plans to distribute the safety tags at the 2023 World Championships in Las Vegas. There will be more details to come as the World Championship approach.

### It's Getting Hot - Make Sure to Eat and Drink Water!

**Softball New Report** 

he American Red Cross and Dignity Health recommend that people who are active outdoors in the summer heat not only drink water, but also eat.

"While water remains the most highly recommended option for hydrating your body, many vegetables, such as cucumbers, celery and lettuce, as well as fruits, such as melons, strawberries and



apples, contain water," said Carolyn Heneghan, a health columnist with Dignity.

According to the Red Cross, common symptoms of

heat stroke or heat exhaustion can be "heavy sweating cold, pale and clammy skin, fast or weak pulse, nausea or vomiting, muscle cramps, tiredness or weakness, and dizziness-headache or passing out." Having food, especially healthy food, can help prevent nausea, vomiting, stomach cramps, tiredness and more symptoms of heat stroke.

Heat stroke is to be taken very seriously. The

effects of heat stroke if gone unchecked and ignored, can lead to "acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS), brain swelling, kidney failure, liver failure, metabolic dysfunction, nerve damage, [and] reduced blood flow to the heart and other circulatory problems," according to the Mayo Clinic.

Stay safe while playing ball; drink room temperature water and remember to eat healthy foods.

### Stay Safe When You Travel: From the AARP

#### **Room Bandits**

Before you book a room, make sure your lodging is in the safest part of the city. Call ahead or email hotel management to ask about secruity precautions: For example, what controls are there on access to the main entrance and to room areas? At the hotel, take a few simple precautions. Put the Do Not Disturb sign on your door even when you are not in the roomn, to make it appear occupied. Use the safe in your room for locking up valuables and important documents such as passports. Finally, never share your room

number with anyone outside your travel party.

#### **Pickpockets**

Use a crossbody anti-theft purse with zipper locks or a hidden waist wallet. Don't keep anything in your back pocket. Remove anything from your wallet that isn't neccessary to carry while you travel. Keep photos of your passport, credit cards and critial information in a password-protected folder on your phone or online stoarge account. Make sure any travel partner has credit cards with account numbers different from yours, so you can still make

purchases if stolen cards are canceled.

Coincidentally I also graduated high school in 1971, and I found this book really took me back to those days. Do you Boomers remember those heavy flannel uniforms we wore back then? I found myself transported back to my own high school days as I read this book.

For the "Soul of Baseball" Posnanski spent more than a year accompanying the then 90-year-old O'Neil all over the country as he promoted Negro League stars for

the Hall of Fame, and campaigned not just for them to be remembered for the great ballplayers they were, but to memorialize their times, their existence, and their importance.

O'Neil died in 2006 at age 94 and was not elected to the HOF until after his death, in 2022. O'Neil's humility, wisdom, and poetic way with words are truly inspiring. The United States was not a friendly place for Black Americans in their time and yet they carved out a niche for themselves.

They knew how to have fun, too. O'Neil's famous "Nancy" story is worth summarizing here. O'Neil's team was on a road trip to St. Louis, and star pitcher and teammate Satchel Paige invited a beautiful young woman from St Louis named Nancy to visit him at the team hotel. After they went upstairs together, O'Neil looked out the lobby window and spotted Paige's fiancé from

Cincinnati climbing out of a cab. Enlisting the bellboy's help, O'Neil alerted Paige of the situation. Paige dashed down the fire escape, came to the lobby from the front door as if just arriving himself, and escorted the fiancé to an unoccupied hotel room down the hall from the others.

Shortly thereafter Paige tried to collect the St. Louis woman to hustle her out of the room, and called out down the hotel hallway, "Nancy- Nancy, where are you?" Simultaneously the fiancé and O'Neil poked their heads out from their respective rooms, at which point Paige says to O'Neil, "Nancy, what time does the game start tomorrow?"

And from then on, he was known as Nancy.





Barney Fineblum, 96, of Woodbine, MD., died on May 23.


Barney was not only a well-known player and manager with Senior Softball USA, but also an ambassador for the sport.

### Caffeine Can Enhance Athletic Performance

Caffeine is more complex than you might realize. Here's a brief summary of what it can, and does not, do.

The most common sources of caffeine are, obviously, coffee and tea. Soda and energy drinks are other sources.

Soda generally contains 3 to 6 mg caffeine per ounce. The amount of caffeine in coffee depends on how it is brewed, but is often 10 to 13 mg/oz. Red Bull and Monster energy drinks contain 10 mg caffeine per ounce, though some brands don't make it clear how much they contain. I recommend you avoid all energy drinks. When you want to consume caffeine, choose coffee or tea. They provide some surprising health benefits!

Louise Burke, PhD, and colleagues reviewed the published research on this topic in their excellent book "Caffeine for Sports Performance" (2013). Here's what they concluded:

- Endurance sports (running, cycling, cross-country skiing for more than an hour): definitely beneficial.
- High-intensity sports (running, cycling, swimming, rowing for 1-30 minutes): definitely beneficial.
- Stop-and-go sports (basketball, soccer, tennis): possibly beneficial (better research needed.)
- Strength/power events (shot put, high jump, weight-lifting): performance-enhancement is unlikely.
- Skill Sports (archery, golf, target-shooting): unclear, not enough research.

The typical caffeine dose in these studies ranged 3 to 6 mg/kg. But keep in mind there is a substantial placebo effect that can influence how athletes respond to caffeine.

No studies in baseball or softball players were included. I performed a PubMed search and no studies were retrieved, however, I found this interesting study published in 2016:

Experienced male golfers were given 155 mg caffeine at the start of a round of golf, and another 155 mg after nine holes. The total dose averaged 3.8 mg/kg. Drive distance, ability to reach the green, and total score during 18 holes of play all improved.

Anyone who consumes caffeine knows that it can make you jittery, and, might affect your ability to fall asleep, though these effects depend on how much you consume (and when you consume it), and if you consume caffeine daily or not.

Many people believe that caffeine can cause dehydration. This is greatly exaggerated. Caffeine does have a diuretic action, but it is very mild... much weaker than alcohol or prescription diuretics.

Also, exercise causes blood flow to shift towards muscles and away from the kidneys. So, this overrides the already weak diuretic action of caffeine.

Third, the amount of liquid you consume when drinking coffee, tea, and soda compensates for the diuretic effect.

Finally, people who consume caffeine regularly develop tolerance to both the jitteriness and the diuretic effect.

Can a caffeine overdose be fatal?

Yes! Single doses above 600-800 mg can provoke cardiac arrhythmias, even in healthy people with no heart disease. There have also been reports of people dying after consuming too much caffeine from energy drinks.

Also, combining caffeine with ephedra/ephedrine is very risky.

In conclusion, I see nothing wrong with having a cup or two of coffee before a softball game. It might even help you hit the ball farther!
